Is God a UConn Fan?

And so, for me, that raises an important theological question: Is God a UConn fan?

The answer to that question, I believe, is yes. I bet you didn't expect that answer, right? Allow me to explain.

While I do believe God is a UConn fan, I don't believe God is deciding which sports teams win and which ones lose. I just don't think that's God's role to play in the world.

It's why you may have heard me say before, "We can't pray to God for our team to win, but we can say thank you when it happens."

What I mean by that is that while God isn't in the business of picking which teams win and which teams lose, God is present with every team when they win *or* lose. And saying thank you to God for God's presence in the moments of our highest highs and lowest lows is something we should all, always be doing.

So in that way, we're saying that yes, God is a fan of UConn... just as God is a fan of Purdue, and Alabama and every other team, in every other sport, that laces up their shoes, or cleats, to compete. God is a fan because God loves us all. Which means that God celebrates with us when we win, and cries tears alongside us when we lose.

So all of this is to say that while we can't start praying now for a three-peat, we can start hoping that God will be celebrating with us, next April, when the UConn men raise their 7th national championship trophy a day after the women raise their 12th. And then we can thank God for the celebration that will be!
